## 10TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME, YEAR B

### COMMENTARY ON READINGS

**First Reading:** God confronts Adam and Eve on their disobedience to His direct command not to eat of the tree of knowledge. Their evasive answer shows their weakness of not taking responsibility for their actions. God condemns the serpent because He knows the serpent will never repent. He chastises and punishes Adam and Eve, but He also holds out to them a forgiving hand and a promise of redemption.. (Gn 3:9-15)

#### RESPONSORIAL PSALM (Ps. 130) "With the Lord there is mercy, and fullness of redemption."

Out of the depths I cry to you, O Lord Let your ears be attentive to my voice in supplication. **Res** 

If you, O LORD, mark iniquities, LORD, who can stand? But with you is forgiveness, that you may be revered. **Res** 

I trust in the LORD; my soul trusts in his word. More than sentinels wait for the dawn, let Israel wait for the LORD. **Res** 

For with the LORD is kindness and with him is plenteous redemption and he will redeem Israel from all their iniquities. **Res** 

**Second Reading:** This passage is a summary of the same subject in Paul's format, wherein he reflects on his own past life and its change through the "grace bestowed in abundance." He is encouraging the Corinthians to keep in mind the promise of heaven for those who hold out until their end. We should be encouraged by this also, for the same promise has been given to us through Baptism and the faith we profess. (2 Corinthians 4:13-5:1)

**Gospel:** This can be a confusing, or even baffling passage if we don't put it together with the thoughts expressed above. Obviously, Satan (the devil) works behind the scenes to get mankind to sin through our weaknesses. But, if we are aware of our weaknesses and ask for God's help against them with sincerity and a firm purpose of amendment, we can be assured that He will give us that help. And then (if we have God on our side), who can harm us?. **(Mark 3:20-35)**

## FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Dear Parishioners,

"Where are you?"

Though Ordinary time started two Sundays ago (after the Solemnity of Pentecost), today is the first Sunday green vestments are used. We celebrated two solemnities—Trinity Sunday and Corpus Christi—and white vestments are used on such solemnities. From now until the Solemnity of Christ the King, green will be the primary color.

It is important to remember that Ordinary time does not mean ordinary in the sense of routine. Therefore, anything goes. In the <u>"General Norms for the Liturgical</u> <u>Year and the Calendar,"</u> the meaning of Ordinary Time is spelled out: "Besides the times of year that have their own distinctive character, there remain in the yearly cycle thirty-three or thirty-four weeks in which no particular aspect of the mystery of Christ is celebrated, but rather the mystery of Christ itself is honored in its fullness, especially on Sundays" (43).

The color green, which represents Ordinary Time, serves as a reminder of our collective need to flourish and grow as disciples of the Lord. Let us, therefore, commit to practical steps that will lead to noticeable growth in our Christian life by the time we reach the end of Ordinary Time with the celebration of the Solemnity of Christ the King. These steps should include prayer, reading the word of God, acts of charity, and, most importantly, actively contributing to the growth and unity of our parish community.

How often do we excuse our sins or blame others for our failings? Today's first reading leads us to reflect on such questions. After the man, Adam, had eaten of the tree, the LORD God called to the man and asked him, "Where are you?" This question, simple as it may sound, is loaded with meaning. God was asking Adam, Adam, where do you stand in relation to me. Adam's response clearly shows the relationship that existed between them and God: "I heard you in the garden; but I was afraid, because I was naked, so I hid myself." This statement implies this was not the first time God came to them. However, this time, they went into hiding. In the reaction of Adam and Eve, we see a reflection of human nature. For most of us, there is an attempt to cover one's sins and shame. We do not want people to know about it. However, we cannot hide our sins from God. Let us endeavor to own our sins before God and ask for forgiveness and mercy.

The LORD bless you and keep you! The LORD let his face shine upon you, and be gracious to you! The LORD look upon you kindly and give you peace!

#### **FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS (FAQs)**

**Ques:** In one of the responses for the proclamation of the mystery of faith, we refer to the body of Christ as bread: "When we eat this bread and drink this cup." How do you square this with the teaching of the Church that the Eucharist is really and literally the body and blood of Christ?

**Ans:** You are right. The Church teaches that Christ is really, truly and substantially present, body and blood, soul and divinity, in the Eucharist. This presence is the effect of the Eucharistic Prayer, during which the priest invokes Jesus' words at the Last Supper: "This is my body.... This is my blood...." The species of bread and wine are thus sacramentally transformed into the real body and blood of Christ (cf. CCC#1353).

This transformation is called "real" because, "it is a substantial presence by which Christ, God and man, makes himself wholly and entirely present." (CCC #1374). The theological term for describing the transformation which takes place in the bread and wine is transubstantiation. Trans means "change" and substantiation means "substance." In other words, what is made present in the Eucharist is the real, true and substantial person of the Risen Christ, which is the biblical meaning of "body." Although this may seem incomprehensible, we know from human experience that it is possible to experience the presence of a person who is no longer physically present with us.

Now, to the first part of your question. The words of the first acclamation of faith are actually a paraphrasing of what Paul says about the Eucharist: "For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes" (1 Cor. 11:26). It is one of many expressions that evoke different aspects of the Eucharist (CCC #1328–1329). Furthermore, when we call the body of Christ "bread" we are merely echoing Jesus' own words, "I am the living bread which came down from heaven" (Jn 6:51).
